SHORT RESPONSES / CLASS WIKI (READ CAREFULLY)

Each student has been assigned to one of three **Groups, E, H** or **J**. Before each class, everyone will do ALL of the assigned reading. If your Group is assigned that day, each student will individually write an informal response of at **least 300 words** to the reading, and post it on our wiki before 3am on the day it appears on the schedule.

Your response must include at least:

- 1. A **quotation** (with quotation marks! for example: "I hate it like I hate hell the man who says one thing and thinks another")
- 2. A **citation** for the quotation (titles of works in *italics!* for example: *Iliad*, 9.317-318)
- 3. **Contextualize** the quotation (Who said it? When? To whom? About what?)
- 4. Talk about its **significance** in the reading or why you choose it

Responses don't have to be formal, but must be **at least 300 words long**. NO secondary research is required. If you use any resources to supplement your reading, these must be in your response. Using unacknowledged sources in your response will constitute plagiarism, and will result in a failing grade for the course. **Failure to submit 2 of these on time will result in a failing grade for the class**.

Type these responses in a separate document then copy and paste them onto the Wiki using the EDIT function at the top of the page.

If your Group is NOT assigned that day, read through your classmates' responses, and use the comment box to comment on at least three of them. These comments don't need to be more than a few sentences long. Failure to comment on more than 3 occasions will result in a failing grade for the course. These responses will not be accepted late.
