The Perfect Tense

The Perfect Tense expresses past completed action. The personal endings for the perfect tense are attached to the third principal part of the verb (which itself is the first person singular of the perfect tense).

The perfect passive is formed by the combination of the present tense of *esse* with the fourth principal part of the verb (which is the perfect passive participle). As a participle, this form of the verb can show number, case and gender.

Note that the participle element of the perfect passive (*i.e.*, *amātus*, *monitus*, *positus*, *auditus*, *etc.*) will show number and gender:

Vox audita est. *The voice was heard*. Virī monitī sunt. *The men were warned* Nos puellae amātae sumus. *We girls were loved*. The Perfect tense of *sum*, *possum*, *and eō* are irregular:

The Perfect Infinitive

The perfect active infinitive is formed by adding *-isse* to the perfect stem:

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am\bar{a}v\bar{\iota} \rightarrow am\bar{a}visse to have loved to have warned posu\bar{\iota} \rightarrow posuisse to have placed aud\bar{\iota}v\bar{\iota} \rightarrow aud\bar{\iota}visse to have heard
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The perfect passive infinitive is formed by adding *esse* to the fourth principal part of the verb:

| amātum esse | to have been loved |

| positum esse | to have been placed |
| audītum esse | to have been heard |

Both the active and passive infinitives are common in Indirect Speech. Note the examples from this chapter:

Intellegēbam tē nōn cornibus, sed pugnīs pulsātum esse. *I understood that you were hit not by horns but by fists*.

Iūlius Mārcum intrāvisse dīcit. Julius says that Marcus has entered.

Mārcus dīcit sē nihil audīvisse praeter initium. *Marcus says that he heard nothing except the beginning.*

Mārcus dīcit sē bonum puerum fuisse et laudātum esse. *Marcus says that he was good boy and that he was praised.*

Pater dīcit tē in lūdō dormīvisse! Father says that you were sleeping in school!

Aemilia literrās ā Mārcō scrīptās esse crēdit. Aemilia believes that the letter was written by Marcus.

Dīxit mē pulcherrimē et rēctissimē scrīpisse. *He said that I wrote very beautifully and most correctly.*

Neuter Nouns of the Fourth Declension

The Fourth Declension contains a small number of neuter nouns, only two of which are common: $corn\bar{u}$ and $gen\bar{u}$. They all decline on the pattern of cornu, $-\bar{u}s$:
