"An introduction to Greek and Roman myths, legends, and tales, especially those that have an important place in the Western cultural tradition."

CLASS STRUCTURE:

We are still in a pandemic. Your health and safety are more important than anything I could ever teach you. If you have any health concerns or are not feeling well, please let me know and do not attend class. I don't need any documentation. Just let me know by email if anything is affecting your ability to do course work.

In the past, I have maintained a strict attendance policy (2 absences = class failure) which greatly benefitted students. While I now longer have that explicit policy, if you regularly miss class and do not communicate with me, you will fail. You should plan on attending and participating in every single class meeting when you are healthy. If you think regular attendance will be a

problem for you, you should consider taking an online version of this class (which I offer this Summer and Fall 2023).

EXAMS:

If you regularly attend class, our exams are open-note/open-book, at-home Midterm and Final exams with plenty of time; the format is short essays based on the readings and material covered in lectures and discussions.

PROJECTS:

Each student will create two online projects which will be shared with the rest of the class online. These projects will be online papers (750-1000 words) which compare and contrast representations of mythological stories with the textual sources of those stories. The first will be a comparison with a work of art; the second will be with some form of modern media (movie, video game, etc.).

POSTINGS/DISCUSSION (READ CAREFULLY)

Each student has been assigned to one of three Groups: J, W, and H.

Before every class, everyone will do ALL of the assigned readings.

If your Group is assigned that day, you must write an informal response to the reading of around **300 words** (fill the comment box on the wiki).

Every post must include at least:

- A **quotation** (with quotation marks! for example: "I hate like it like I hate hell the man who says one thing and thinks another")
- A **citation** for the quotation (for example: *Iliad*, 9.317-318 = book 9 of the *Iliad*, lines 317-318)
- **Contextualize** the quotation (Who said it? When? To whom? About what?)
- Talk about its significance in the reading or why you choose it
- Ask a **question** about something in the reading which was not clear to you

Posts don't have to be formal, but must they must fill the comment box (2000 characters). No secondary research is required. If you use any resources to supplement your reading, these must be explicitly acknowledged in your response. Using unacknowledged sources (including artificial intelligence) in your response will constitute plagiarism, and result in a failing grade for the course. Failure to submit 2 of these on time will result in a failing grade for the course.

If your Group is NOT assigned that day, read through your classmates' posts, and **reply to at least three of them**. These replies don't need to be more than a few sentences long, but must be detailed enough to **clearly show that you have done the reading**. Failure to reply on more than 3 occasions will result in a failing grade for the course.
