### **Course Requirements**

#### **GENERAL DESCRIPTION**

This course is intended to introduce a student to the field of Management. In this course we will get to explore the field of Management by considering the concepts of innovative management and the evolution of the Management thought. We will also examine the environment in which the process of management occurs. In doing so we will look at the corporate culture, the global environment, ethics and social responsibility, and the small business start-up environment. We will also consider the role that planning plays in management by looking at goal setting, strategy formulation and execution, and managerial decision making. Leadership, organizational design, change and innovation management, human resource management and the management of diversity is also examined. We will explore general leadership theory, individual leadership behavior, employee motivation, effective communication and group leadership. Essentially, this course is a buffet of the management menus, and a chance for students to determine which areas of management they are most interested in.

This is a "big picture" course, a trait that makes it a truly different kind of course from other business school courses. Virtually all of the other required and elective courses students take were concerned with a specific functional area (production, marketing, finance, accounting) and/or a well-defined body of knowledge (economics, statistics, legal environment). Its very likely that a few of your previous courses have been highly structured and related closely to a well-developed body of theory. Some provided quantitative techniques for students to engage. Others related to information and specific skills the faculty believe students need to acquire. This course shares few of these traits.

This course is designed to help prepare students for the present business environment. Consequently, professional behavior by the students, including timely material completion, regular attendance and participation (online or in person) is expected. Because this course emulates real business environment, students are intentionally exposed to ambiguity including that of class design. This may include introduction of cases, text/lecture discussion notes etc., without prior warning. This ambiguity is necessary for two principal reasons: (1) More closely emulate true business environment, and (2) allow students to develop greater flexibility and confidence dealing with change.

#### STUDENT VIDEO PRESENTATION / PARTICIPATION

It is very difficult to have participation (in the traditional sense of the word) in an online class. Nonetheless, participation, however, is very important and is expected of our graduates in the industry after graduations – even in virtual positions or functions. In addition to obvious participation measures collected by blackboard system (e.g., your visits to online lectures, number of times you view individual activities etc.), in this class we have an end of the class recap of the course via video presentation. Using the timing shown in the course schedule, every student will present a 3 to 4 minute presentation reflecting on the following:

- 1. What did you learn in the course?
- 2. How can you use this knowledge for your career in the future?
- 3. How can you use the knowledge learned to promote your personal growth?
- 4. What "not so obvious" insights (if any) did you develop?

It is very important for students to reflect on their learning. This is the process that enriches us as individuals to gain insights in to the wonders of learning. It is my hope that students exercise such critical thinking in all their courses, but it is a requirement in this course.

#### **QUIZZES**

Students will be expected to do their quizzes within two weeks of quizzes being open, and before the next EXAM. Quizzes are open book and time limited tests done through the blackboard. An attempt was made to have quizzes opened in different weeks than the exams. Quizzes are designed to help the student evaluate whether if they mastered the material from the textbook before they take the formal theory exam. As such, quizzes count for much less than the exams, and are meant to prepare the student for the exam.

#### THEORY EXAMS

Students will be expected to take multiple theory exams in this course using blackboard. Exams are open book and time limited. Computer will randomly select a predetermined number of questions for each student from the question pool. If students miss an exam (without medical justification) students will incur a penalty.

#### **Quiz / Exam Policy Notes:**

- 1. All quizzes and exams are scheduled as shown in class schedule presented later in this syllabus. Each quiz and exam will be open during the week in which it is shown (Sunday midnight to Sunday midnight)!
- 2. Each student will have three attempts for each quiz and exam where the best score will be taken as the final exam grade.
- 3. No backtracking is allowed.
- 4. No quiz or exam will be reopened.

#### **ONLINE COURSE FORMAT**

In today's day and age, the nature of work, and thereby the nature of learning is continuously changing. Work structures are becoming more fluid and more competitive.
